

SESSION 1

OT100 Old Testament History - Dr. Michael Pabarcus, Instructor
offered Mondays 6-9:30 PM (Jan8-Feb5) and
Wednesdays 8-11:30 AM (Jan10-Feb7)

This course is a study of the origin and development of the nation of Israel in the Old Testament from creation to the return from Babylonian captivity. Special attention is given to placing the prophetic books in their historical context.

TH200 Introduction to Christian Theology - Doug Phillips, Instructor
offered Thursdays 6-9:30 PM (Jan11-Feb8)

This course will examine specific doctrines such as the person of God, salvation, the church and eschatology. The student will also survey the tasks, benefits and challenges of theology.

SESSION 2

NT100 New Testament History - Don Sanders, Instructor
offered Mondays 6-9:30 PM (Feb26-Mar26) and
Wednesdays 8-11:30 AM (Feb28-Mar28)

This course covers three primary periods of biblical history: inter-testamental history, the life of Christ, and early church history as presented in the book of Acts. Special attention is given to the placement of the New Testament books within the historical context of Acts.

TH210 Introduction to Biblical Interpretation -
Dr. Michael Pabarcus, Instructor
offered Thursdays 6-9:30 PM (Mar1-Mar29)

This class surveys past and present approaches to interpreting the Bible. Students will learn guidelines for interpreting specific literary genres and forms of speech, along with practical strategies for personal Bible study.

SESSION 3

NT110 Teachings of Jesus - Nikomas Perez, Instructor
offered Mondays 6-9:30 PM (Apr16-May14) and
Wednesdays 8-11:30 AM (Apr18-May16)

A proper understanding of the teachings of Jesus is essential for growing discipleship. Topics include the major teachings of each of the four gospels. Special attention is given to Jesus' teaching on discipleship, salvation, and parables.

PH200 Survey of World Views - Don Sanders, Instructor
offered Thursdays 6-9:30 PM (Apr19-May17)

This class introduces students to the historical development of significant world views. Topics include theism, deism, naturalism, nihilism, existentialism, and pantheism. Students will also learn specific strategies for sharing their faith across views.
