Open

• If you asked a trusted friend or family member this question: "Tell me all the ways that I look like a hypocrite? In essence, where am I asleep in my spiritual life?" What would they say?

Discuss*

- In what areas of your own spiritual life do you feel somewhat "impregnable"?
- In what areas do you know you must keep a vigilant and alert watch over?
- Jesus tells the Church in Sardis that they have a reputation of "being alive" but that they are dead. In what ways does the reputation of today's Church align with what it really is? In what ways does it not?
- Does your reputation align with who you really are?
- Jesus says there are a "few people in Sardis who have not soiled their garments." How can you, as group a of connected believers, help keep each from "soiling your garments"?

Reflect

- How does Ephesians 5:13-14 instruct us to deal with the inner things that don't align with who we are called to be in Christ?
- Discuss the quote by Dallas Willard below. What does it mean to be a saint who "ravenously feeds on grace" (Terry's words) in your daily life?
- Read 1 Timothy 1:5. What does Paul write is the goal of instruction in Godliness and Christlikeness? How can this become your goal? (Hint: Find a way to use the word "transformation" as much as possible in your discussion!)
- Read Romans 8:34. Silently ask Jesus to align *your* prayers for you with *His* prayers for you.
- Together pray the Lord's Prayer (Matthew 6:9-13). Ask God to have His Kingdom come and His will be done on earth as it is in Heaven *in you first*, to make you a bearer of His Kingdom in all you do and everywhere you go. This is how revival begins, in individual believers.
