## Discuss\*

- How does knowing some of the background of Laodicea help you to understand the message of Jesus to the church?
- Don pointed out that many Bible translations use the word "spit" or "spew" instead of the more literal "vomit" in verse 16. What difference does that make?
- Three points of application were 1) We are always quick to receive comfort from Jesus, but often resist correction; 2) There is a dangerous connection between physical wealth and spiritual poverty; 3) It's never too late to repent. Which one of these tends to be hardest for most Christians? For you?
- To whom is Jesus speaking in Revelation 3:19-20? How might this change the way you understand these verses?

## Reflect

- In the next week, how can you be intentional about creating the space for God to show you what blindspot(s) he wants to address in your life?
- Who do you have in your life that you can invite into this process of identifying blindspots?
- Based just on this discussion, what should we pray about?
